Justice



Today: cross-border personal and business relationships are a reality...

- 14 million citizens reside in a MS other than their MS of origin
- 13% of all marriages in the EU are international
- 50% of SMEs are engaged in cross-border activities





...but citizens face burdens when moving between Member States...

- Citizens must present public documents to benefit from right or comply with obligation:
- Administrative formalities to authenticate a public document:
 - Legalisation
 - Apostille
- Certified translations of public documents
- Costs
- Legal uncertainty



Costs and challenges in the EU

• Apostille:

- 1,4 million public documents / year
- Time for obtaining an Apostille: up to 6 months
- **Certified translations:** 1,6 million public documents / year
- Total costs: €330 million / year
- Fraud prevention: no structured administrative cooperation among MS





Costs and challenges in the EU

Fragmented legal framework:

1) International conventions

- Hague 1961 Apostille Convention
- 1968 Council of Europe Convention
- CIEC Conventions
- 2) EU law:
 - 1987 Convention
 - Brussels I Regulation
 - Brussels IIa Regulation and more...

<u>Result</u>: only some documents, only some MS

=> legal uncertainty





... so citizens' rights, based on the Treaty, are often frustrated

- Article 21 TFEU:
 - free movement of citizens
- Article 114 TFEU: internal market:
 - freedom of establishment
 - freedom to provide services





Background of COM proposal

• 2009 Stockholm Programme:

- priorities in Justice and Home Affairs 2010-2014: citizens
- request COM to present proposal to eliminate legalisation formalities between MS

• 2010 COM Green Paper:

- free movement of documents
- recognition of the effects of certain public documents (civil status)
- 2011 COM Single Market Act:
 - elimination of barriers to internal market freedoms by citizens and businesses



COM proposal

- Presented on **24 April 2013**
- Proposal for a Regulation on promoting the free movement of <u>citizens</u> and <u>businesses</u> by simplifying the acceptance of certain public documents in the European Union and amending Regulation (EU) No 1024/2012
- Legal basis: Articles 21 and 114 TFEU





Key elements of COM proposal

- **Abolishing formalities**: 'legalisation' and 'Apostille'
- Certified copy instead of original, or plain copy with original
- Non-certified /certified translations of public documents issued by other MS must be accepted
- Introduction of EU multilingual standard forms
- Improving **administrative cooperation** between MS to fight against fraud





Scope The Regulation:

- will apply between MS, taking precedence over international agreements as between them
- will not affect the relationship between MS and third countries
- **complements** other specific EU-instruments





Scope The Regulation:

- concerns the **authenticity** of public documents presented in another MS
- does not provide for the recognition of effects of public documents in another MS
- does not harmonise national public documents or substantive law





What is a public document?

- a document issued by a **public authority** (including private entities entrusted with public duties)
- having **formal evidentiary value**
- relating to one of the **12 categories** covered by the Regulation





Documents covered: 12 categories

Civil status

- Birth
- Death
- Name
- Marriage
- Registered Partnership
- Adoption
- Parenthood

Business

 Legal status and representation of a company or other undertaking

Other areas

- Real estate
- Citizenship and nationality
- Residence
- Absence of a criminal record



- Proposal promotes principle of mutual trust
- But, in case of reasonable doubt on authenticity of document, in particular:
 - authenticity of signature
 - capacity of person signing
 - seal or stamp

Which cannot otherwise be resolved =>





- Structured administrative cooperation
- Possibility to submit a request for information directly to issuing MS or to go via the Central Authorities
- MS will designate (one or more) Central Authority and communicate contact details (publicly available through EJN)
- Main function of Central Authorities:
 - Receive and transmit requests for information
 - Supply information needed for requests



• Other functions of Central Authorities:

- Exchange best practices on acceptance of documents, prevention of fraud, use of electronic versions of documents
- Establish templates of public documents
- Through use of European Judicial Network (EJN)
- Requests for information:
 - Individual and specific
 - Response within a month
 - If authenticity not confirmed, no obligation to accept





- Contacts between receiving and issuing authorities through the Internal Market Information System (IMI):
 - Internet-based software application developed by COM and MS to facilitate information exchanges
 - Applied since 2008, covers other EU instruments
 - (Multilingual) Repository of models of national public documents
 - Multilingual pre-translated standard questions and answers





EU multilingual standard forms

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MULTILINGUAL STANDARD FORM CONCERNING THE LEGAL STATUS AND REPRESENTATION OF A COMPANY OR OTHER UNDERTAKING

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Legal note: This EU multilingual standard form is made available by the authorities of the issuing Member State and may be requested alternatively to the equivalent public document existing in that Member State. It shall not prejudice the use of an equivalent national public document drawn up by the authorities of the issuing Member State. It shall have the same formal evidentiary value as the national equivalent of the issuing Member State, and it shall be used without prejudice to the substantive law of the Member States relating to the legal status and representation of a company or other undertaking.

• 5 Forms:

- Birth
- Death
- Marriage
- Registered partnership
- Legal status of a company
- Optional:
 - issued at citizen's request
 - under the same conditions
- Parallel: does not exclude use of domestic documents
- Same evidentiary value as domestic documents
- Aim: reduce translation requirements





Review

- Every 3 years, COM report on application of Regulation
- With proposed amendments, including on:
 - Extension of scope
 - Additional EU multilingual standard forms



European Parliament: Draft Report on proposal (26 July 2013)

- Rapporteur: MEP Bernhard Rapkay (DE, S&D)
- Supports proposal as "extremely important to citizens of the EU"
- Draft report beyond COM proposal:
 - Extension of scope: document categories and authorities
 - Abolition of certified copies
 - MS to bear costs of certified translations
 - 10 new EU standard forms
- Discussions with other political groups



European Economic and Social Committee (EESC) (11 July 2013)

Consultative role

•Full support of COM proposal (extension of scope)

Committee of the Regions (31 July 2013)

"Legalisation is not a suitable measure to prevent fraud"
"Local and regional authorities should have access to the IMI"

Council of the EU

•Negotiations started in June 2013 under IE Presidency, continuing under LT Presidency, will continue into EL Presidency
